## Strategies for Supporting Students Unable to Attend Class Meetings

## Structure the Canvas Course Shell to Support Both In-Person and Remote Learners

The most effective strategy for supporting students who must miss class, e.g., due to illness, quarantine requirement, etc., is one that will also benefit students who attend every class meeting *and* make teaching more efficient for you. This strategy is to structure your course materials in Canvas to provide optimum clarity, consistency, and prompts to engage in course activities.
